140th Anniversary of Venerable Hedwig's Fiat

The feast of the Annunciation is a vital feast in the salvation history. The Virgin Mary's "yes" welcomed the incarnation of God among us in the being of Jesus Christ. Hedwig's "yes" provided a strength, courage, insight and contemplative spirituality in the birthing of a new congregation.

This year on the feast of the Annunciation we also celebrate the 140th Anniversary of Venerable Hedwig's fiat. As the Angelus Bells were ringing, on the Feast of the Annunciation in 1881, Hedwig Borzecka, at the age of 18 made her personal "fiat" to answer Christ's invitation to follow Him and to courageously help her mother in founding the Congregation of the Sisters of the Resurrection.

Hedwig celebrated March 25th of each year very solemnly. Hedwig, reflecting on the anniversary of her "fiat", once wrote: "I feel possession of Jesus! And I see it as a great grace, this giving myself to Jesus, that there is none greater in heaven itself."

In her book, <u>The Daughter</u>, Sr. Teresa Matea Florczak states that "From then on, Hedwig celebrated March 25th of each year very solemnly."

Because of the COVID Pandemic the celebration was totally virtual with a prayer service conducted via conference call and each Sister calling Sister Virginia Ann during the day to extend a personal thank you.

Thank you, Sister Virginia Ann for twelve amazing and grace-filled years of service to our Province and to each of us your Sisters. May God bless you and keep you in His watchful care.

Aging with Grace: by Sister Hedwig Kuczynski, C.R.

In an address at the end January, 2021 Pope Francis spoke about the special grace the elderly are to the Church, to their families and to society. Pope Francis stated, "Today I want to tell you that the elderly are the present and tomorrow of the church. Yes, they are also the future of a church, which, together with young people, prophesies and dreams. That is why it is so important that the old and the young talk to each other. It is so important."

"In the Bible, longevity is a blessing," the pope noted. It is a time to face one's fragility and to recognize how reciprocal love and care within a family really are.

"Giving long life, God the father gives time to deepen one's awareness of him and to deepen intimacy with him, to draw closer to his heart and abandon oneself to him," the pope said. "It is a time to prepare to consign our spirit into his hands, definitively, with the trust of children. But it also is a time of renewed fruitfulness."

As part of the tribute to Saint Joseph, Pope Francis released an Apostolic Letter, "Patris Corde" (With a Father's Heart). It is a beautiful tribute to Saint Joseph as a husband, father, and Patron of the Universal Church.

Here are a few quotes from Pope Francis' Letter.

A tender and loving father



Joseph saw Jesus grow daily "in wisdom and in years and in divine and human favour" (Lk 2:52). As the Lord had done with Israel, so Joseph did with Jesus: he taught him to walk, taking him by the hand; he was for him like a father who raises an infant to his cheeks, bending down to him and feeding him (cf. Hos 11:3-4).

In Joseph, Jesus saw the tender love of God: "As a father has compassion for his children, so the Lord has compassion for those who fear him" (Ps 103:13).

An obedient father



In every situation, Joseph declared his own "fiat", like those of Mary at the Annunciation and Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

During the hidden years in Nazareth, Jesus learned at the school of Joseph to do the will of the Father.

An Accepting father



The spiritual path that Joseph traces for us is not one that explains, but accepts. Only as a result of this acceptance, this reconciliation, can we begin to glimpse a broader history, a deeper meaning.

Joseph is certainly not passively resigned, but courageously and firmly proactive. In our own lives, acceptance and welcome can be an expression of the Holy Spirit's gift of fortitude. Only the Lord can give us the strength needed to accept life as it is...

SISTER ANNE DAY March 5th is the death anniversary of Sister Anne and is traditionally a day for the whole Immaculate Conception Province to celebrate the gift of Sister Anne. This year Sister Christine Maria Moskal, C.R. prepared a lovely reflection on Sister Anne and planned and distributed the makings for root beer floats.





TOUR OF AMAZING GRACE On March 5th eight Sisters visited the new Amazing Grace Assisted Living & Memory Care facility that was once our Provincial Home. The staff toured the Sisters and treated them to lunch. The facility is beautiful and designed to provide sensitive and quality care to seniors and especially those with memory challenges. Being that the tour was on Sister Anne's death anniversary the Sisters all commented that

As I begin my term as the chair of the Center for Resurrection Studies, I am happy to share some of the goals for the year.


