RESURRECTION STUDIES - "THE MORAL AND RELIGIOUS RENEWAL OF SOCIETY"

The perpetually professed Sisters of the Resurrection wear a chain that supports our Profession Cross. Each link in the chain can be regarded as a moment in time when we have been called to place our TRUST in God. The persons, situations, blessings,

assignments, illnesses, troubles, worries and graces of our lives have created a veritable chain that supports our daily dying and rising. Interlinking TRUST in God and in one another creates a sturdy support for a lifetime of spiritual transformations. Without faith, there can be no miracles. Without TRUST, how can Jesus heal? The current problems of our society are legion. Such painful experiences have parallels in the numerous challenges that confronted our Founders and Foundresses. Our C.R. charism is most relevant today. We live, die and rise in context.

"It was the best of times, and the worst of times . . . so like our own." - Tale of Two Cities. Looking back, we can see that Janski was a brilliant student led down a dark path by atheistic educators. However, he was "the first to see the light", the formation of "a new religious community called to work for the religious and moral renewal of society". His successor, Fr. Semenenko liked revolutionary books and at age 15 became one of the ten most wanted men in France, renowned for stirring up riots on the street corners. No monopoly of summer terrors here. Yet, by God's mercy, Peter would become an esteemed theologian and pastoral leader, author, confessor and counselor. Fr. Kajsiewicz, a cultured man, also a wounded veteran, became a gifted C.R. speaker and administrator. Sadly, he was recipient of erroneous information that resulted in the temporary expulsion of Semenenko from the Congregation. They trusted and healed that rift. To Fr. Semenenko, Celine Borzecka entrusted her soul and that of her daughter, Hedwig, who prayed her own trustful FIAT under Semenenko's guidance. Fr. Barczynski, veteran and novice under Fr. Semenenko became spiritual leader of hundreds of thousands of Poles in America. His TRUST in God and his heroic charity were legendary, even in his lifetime. At the turn of the century, Sr. Anne discovered new customs, new problems. Also, new graces, new vocations, new future. Norwood Park. TRUST. Five Tabernacles. TRUST. Death to self. TRUST. God blessed all of these leaders with His provident care and a spiritual harvest spanning centuries. The TRUST that plants seeds in faraway lands, Chicago, Tanzania, could even reap a harvest of vocations from an onion patch and a land scarce in natural water. Look around at the hardships, and the graces, of 2021 and see God's hand at work. Certainly, we live in painful and sinful times. Terrifying. We are called, as were our predecessors, to TRUST whatever Divine Providence sends us for our complete dying and thus our complete rising. If we TRUST, there is no limit to God's grace. Even NOW, as we hurt and struggle with covid and confusion, "Jesus I TRUST in YOU."

July 12-17 Annual Retreat

Thirteen sisters made this retreat with Father David Colhour, C.P. The retreat took place at Ascension Living Resurrection Village. Some of the conferences were in Chapel but most were in the Terrace Room. Father David focused on the Scriptures as we experience them in our daily lives. On day one and two Father challenged us to Metanoia, to open our arms like Christ on the Cross, to receive the grace God offers us. He encouraged us to not only reflect on what we would like God to do for us but also reflect on what he has done for us.

On day three Father challenged us to read the gospel passage on Emmaus and focus on the way Jesus moves from stranger, to companion, to guest, and finally to host in the "breaking of the bread." Jesus breaks into our lives the same way. The Emmaus story gives us a model of discipleship – before we see with our eyes, we see with our hearts that burn within us.

On day four Father reflected on Mary and how her Magnificat is a model for prayer. Mary teaches us to reflect on God's presence and activity in our lives. Mary teaches us to open our eyes and our hearts to God's Spirit directing us beyond our imaginings.

On day five Father spoke about how important it is to read and reflect on Scripture not simply as a historical document but rather to see it as God's living and active movement in our personal lives. God's Word is alive and active, it transforms us today as it transformed the prophets and as it transformed the apostles.

Finally, on day six Father discussed the book of Genesis and how it teaches us how special God's relationship is to all He has created. God loves and treasures each person and each thing that He has made. God delights especially in seeing each human person.

For the closing of the retreat, we had the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick.

Coffee, Tea and Saintly Women


The little book club has been meeting once a month since May. In October we will complete our first book, Women of Hope Doctors of the Church by Terry Polakovic.

Our Lady of Sorrows

There are many images of the Sorrowful Mother but, this is my favorite. Except for the expression on Mary's face, her posture and composure are quite similar to that often pictured in the Annunciation.

I first saw this image of the Sorrowful Mother on a website of the Servite Fathers.

I love this image because unlike other images of the Sorrowful Mother that have her looking down with her hands folded to her heart, this image shows her looking to God with trust and open arms.

Mary in the Annunciation and in her Sorrows is truly the handmade of the Lord. She is open and ready to

participate in the Salvation Mystery of her Son.

Just like her Son whose arms were outstretched to embrace from the cross every man, woman and child with love and mercy, so is His Sorrowful Mother ready to embrace everyone with the loving and merciful heart of a mother.

In the eyes of this Sorrowful Mother one can see pain but in the posture of her body and her steady gaze toward heaven one can also see a woman steeped in hope, steeped in union with her Son and with every heart that is broken and every person who suffers.

Mary's experience of sorrow is less about herself and more about her children. Just as Jesus told the women of Jerusalem to not weep for Him but for themselves and their children, so Mary accepts her sorrow in order, to embrace each of us tenderly, fill our hearts with hope and convince us that our God is deeply in love with His people and each individual person.

Mary is a Mother par excellence. Her arms, her lap and her heart were always ready to welcome, embrace, protect and love her Son, Jesus. She embraced and protected Him at birth and as she and Joseph carried Him into Egypt. She embraced Him joyfully when she and Joseph lost Him and found Him in the temple. And when He made the ultimate

sacrifice on the Cross for us, Mary held her Son's dead body in her lap and pressed Him to her heart once again. At that moment she cradled in her lap and in her heart not only Jesus but each of us. Mary's arms and heart are big and she can hold all her children in our joys and in our sorrows.

When Simeon prophesied to Mary, "and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed" (Luke 2: 35) could he have been acknowledging that Mary's call to Motherhood was to embrace all God's children? Mary's call is to be a Mother who cares about the secrets found in each of our hearts. She shares our joys but also our pains and sufferings. As a Mother Mary understands, intercedes for us and holds us to her heart. Our Mother of Sorrows is truly our Mother par excellence.
